- REVISION OF THE UNCITRAL ARBITRATION RULES -

The UNCITRAL Arbitration Rules of 1976 have probably been the most influential arbitration rules and have been used worldwide for both commercial and investment disputes. The United Nations Commission on International Trade Law (UNCITRAL) has since 2006 engaged its Working Group II in a revision of the Rules which now is in a late stage of completion. The revised Rules are expected to be adopted by the UNCITRAL this summer. This half-day conference will present and discuss the draft revised Rules. There will also be a description of the work of the UNCITRAL in general and in the field of arbitration as a background for the presentation of the draft revised Rules.

The discussion will be lead by a panel of leading experts in this field, including:

- **Corinne Montineri**, Legal Officer of the UNCITRAL, Vienna, responsible within the UNCITRAL Secretariat for the revision of the Rules;
- **James Castello**, King & Spalding, Paris, Member of the United States delegation to the UNCITRAL Working Group II;
- **Dr. Patricia Shaughnessy**, Stockholm University, Head of the Arbitration Research Panel at the Stockholm Centre for Commercial Law;
- **Tore Wiwen-Nilsson**, former Chairman of UNCITRAL and at present Chairman of the UNCITRAL Working Group I, who will act as moderator during the conference.
